
moved towards the Mysore city. We reached Mysore by night 9pm and had a stay there.

2)Mysore Zoo:


It is one of the oldest and most popular Zoos in India, and is home to a wide range of species. Mysore Zoo is one of the city's most popular attractions.






We enjoyed very well by seeing the various rare species of animals and birds. Then we had lunch, near the Mysore Zoo and we were ready to visit the next site.

Day 3: 23/01/2018 (Bangalore)


On the next day morning the team moved for an industrial visit to Visvesvaraya industrial and technological museum at Bangalore.








Day 1: Mysore

After getting refreshed at Mysore and having our breakfast, the team moved towards the most beautiful and historical place in India, that is, the Mysore Palace. It is one of the tourist attractions in India. The marble palace is surrounded by a large garden. It's a three storey building, constructed of granite and marbles. The palace is now converted into a museum that treasures souvenirs, paintings, jewellery, royal costumes and other items, which were once possessed by the Wodeyars. The students were really astonished on seeing the art and the tradition of the people in that period. That was really an amazing view.


By 12.30pm we moved towards the Zoo in Mysore. It is the oldest zoo in India. Visiting of the zoo reminded the students about the conservation of the Forest and animals. The Zoological Gardens is had a collection of big cats like Cheetah, Jaguar, Tiger, Lion and small cats like Leopard Cat, Jungle Cat, Common Palm Civet and Small Indian Civet. A bridge was made right in the centre of the aviary, to enable visitors to walk through the bridge and watch the birds closely. Painted Stork, Pelican, Blue and White Peacocks, colourful Flamingoes, Cranes, etc. can be seen in this aviary very easily. It is the only zoo in India to exhibit a Gorilla. Everyone enjoyed on seeing it and enjoyed by walking through the zoo for nearly 2 hours. The activity of the monkeys really made the students to forget their tierdness of walking in the zoo.

After having the lunch by 2.30pm the team went to the rest house and after a small refreshment they got back to visit the Brindavan garden. We reached the garden by 4pm. The three-terraced gardens feature many attractions. Water fountains adorn the finely manicured grounds of this sprawling area and some of the main flora found across the Gardens includes beautiful Ficus trees and flowering plants like celosia, marigolds and bougainvilleas. The larger area

around the Brindavan Gardens is a haven for plant lovers and professional horticulturists. One can find the latest growing techniques being demonstrated and different breeds of a wide variety of fruits, flowers and other plants in these large plantations. The students enjoyed there by playing and seeing the view of the garden and the water fountains over there. After a small shopping there, the team moved for DJ, which was arranged for them. There the students exhibited the talent of dancing. After having the dinner we returned back to the rest house by 9.30pm and had a great sleep.

Day 2: Coorg

Next day everyone got freshed up by 6am and started our journey towards Coorg. It is the smallest district of Karnataka. Coorg is also known as Kodagu. Evergreen forests, spices and coffee plantations are found in Coorg. After having our breakfast reached the Namdrolling Monastery by 9am. It is also called Golden Temple, due to its appearance. This is the largest teaching center of Nyingmapa, a lineage of Tibetan Buddhism, in the world and is home to a sangha community of over 5000 monks and nuns. This place is a calm and majestic sight, surrounded by its landscaped gardens. The students were really happy to seen the monks in the monastery and enjoyed by taking the selfies with them.








PLANNING:

Abish was selected as the tour co-coordinator and Sis.M.Selva Anna Mary as the Asst.coordinator. Flight travel arrangements and booking tickets were done by Fr.D.Shaiju Das and Fr.R.P. Robin Raj. Then the train tickets and the bus were booked by the travel committee members Mr.A.Alan Abislin and Mr.P.Shyju. The accommodation and food was given by Good Samaritan Mission in Mumbai, arranged by Mrs. Mary Pelsit (Head of the dept.). In Goa accommodation was given by Santa Monica Convent at Old Goa and the food was given by St.Xaviers Catering Service, this was arranged by Fr.R.P.Robin Raj and Fr.D.Shaiju Das (student trainees).

Mainly the trainees planned to visit Sion Hospital, Daravi slum, Mazagon Dock Shipyard Ltd, TATA Institute of social science in Mumbai, Chaithanya Hospital in Pune and Goa.

Day: 1

First day of study tour was started at 8:00 am from Trivandrum Domestic Airport with 27 students and 2 faculty members. Flight departure at 10:55 am and arrived Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport, Mumbai at 1:00pm. After that the students and the faculty members to have lunch at 2:00pm. Then the group reached Ancient Pilgrimage Mount, Mary Cathedral Church, Bandra at 3:50pm. The Basilica of Our Lady of the Mount, more commonly known as Mount Mary Church, is a Roman Catholic Basilica located in Bandra, Mumbai. The feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated here on the first sunday after 8 September, the birthday of the Virgin Mary. The feast is followed by a week-long celebration known locally as the Bandra Fair and is visited by thousands of people and visited the Bandra beach nearby the church, then the group left Bandra at 5:00pm and reached the staying place Good Samaritan Mission, Vikhroli at 6:00pm. After arranging their things the group had their dinner at 8:30pm.

Day:2

The second day of the study tour was started with prayer at 7:45am. The group had their breakfast after getting the instructions from the tour coordinator at 8:45am. Then the group departure from the staying place to Lokmania Tilak Municipality General Hospital, Sion at Mumbai, and arrived at 10:45am. Social work department in Sion hospital was established on 1956. The orientation was given by Mr. Motiram Krikire, (Community Development Officer) and Mrs. Smitha, Psychiatric counselor. The main activity of social work department was presented through documentation by Mr. Krikire. There are eight community development officers are working under social work department, then the students visited those officers and interacted with them.

This hospital at a unique situation and is the first major referral hospital and caters to all trauma and disasters from both major highways. Started as a fifty bedded hospital and single OPD, in a military hospital, has grown to more than 1400 beds and planning to expand over few years more rapidly. Currently with 300 senior staff members and 550 postgraduate students, it takes care of around 16 lakhs OPD patients and more than 60000 admissions per year. It provides services in all specialties and many super-specialties. With Many Intensive care units and special clinics, it takes care of complex health problems at very affordable cost. It has special clinics on Learning disability, Hemato-oncology, Thalassemia and Stem cell therapy. Over last 65 years it is offering services to the under privileged sections of the society. The main strength of Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital has been the efficient 'Trauma Care Centre' and emergency Medical services center with the state-of-the-art equipment and facilities. It was the first Trauma Service in our country and possibly in Asia, which has been on a constant 'state of alert' for disasters. This hospital is a nodal center amongst the medical services of the Disaster management plan in the civic context. It has many firsts to its credit like human milk bank, skin bank and first emergency coronary stinting. Social work department plays an major role in the side of poor patients, medical expense. If a particular patient is financially week he/she can enrollee their name in social work department, so that the members from the social work department will collect the neat evidence and then they will refer for the sponsors for their financial help. Expensive treatments will be also reduced in to a simple amount.

Large number of destitute men without hope have found succor in Brother Peter Paul Raj at VIJAY ASHRAM a home for dying destitute at Vikhroli. 1886 dying destitute have been admitted to Vijay Ashram up to now, out of which 1101 were rehabilitated. 485 of these were brought and admitted to the Ashram by the Mumbai and Thane Police. A short orientation was given by Mr.Shojin (Project Manager). It is as follows:



The Tata Institute of Social Science (TISS) is a multi-camps public funded research university in Mumbai, India. TISS is Asia's oldest institute for professional social work education and was founded in 1936 in the Bombay Presidency of British India as the Sir Dorabji Tata Graduation School of Social Work by the Sir Dorabji Tata Trust. In 1944,

the institution was officially renamed as the Tata Institute of Social Science and in 1967; the government of India declared TISS as Deemed University under section 3 of the University Grants Commission Act 1956. The social work department has 9 specializations. Around 400 faculty members are working under this university and 42 faculties are from Social Work Department. TISS's academic programs focus on the Social science and offers doctoral degrees in Management and Labor studies, Disaster Studies, development Studies, Education, Gender Studies, Health Studies, Law, Media and Cultural Studies, Public Policy, Rural Development and social Work. Since its inception TISS had focused on Field action including in responding to disasters such as the Partition of India, the Bhopal Disaster and Uttarkhand Flood. In the end of orientation there was a interaction session between Mrs. Sharon and the student trainees. More questions were arising from the side of students and it was clearly explained by Mrs. Sharon. Then the orientation was completed with the vote of thanks by Mrs. Jeba Cristy.

Next the group visited Sir Dorabji Library. TISS Library was established along with the institute in 1936, is one of the leading social science libraries in the country. The library was named as "Sir Dorabji Tata Memorial Library" on 3 May 2002 in the memory of late Sir Dorabjii Tata. Indian Library Association conferred the library with L. M. Padhya Best University Library Award in 2008. Currently, the library about 123,000 books and 10,298

journals in principle domains of social sciences. The library also operates centre with assistive technologies "M K Tata Centre for the Visually Challenged and a cyber library which provides computers and internet to the students from economically weaker sections. The library has established national and international collaborations including London School Of Economics Library, Mahasarakham University, International Federation of Library Association. Special library for MPhil and PhD scholars.

Day: 4

The fourth day of study tour was started with prayer at 7:00am and had breakfast at 8:30am. The group departure from the staying place to Gateway of India, Mumbai. The **Gateway of India** is an arch-monument built in the early twentieth-century located in the city of Mumbai, in the Indian state of Maharashtra. It was erected to commemorate the landing of the first British monarch in India; King-Emperor George V and Queen-Empress Mary's arrival at Apollo Bunder, Mumbai (then Bombay) in December 1911. Built in the Indo-Saracenic style, incorporating elements of 16th-century Gujarati architecture, the foundation stone for the gateway was laid in March 1913. During the royal visit, the gateway was not yet built and a cardboard structure had greeted the monarch. The final design of the monument by

architect George Wittet was sanctioned only in 1914, and construction was completed in 1924. The structure is a triumphal arch made of basalt, which is 26 meters (85 feet) high.

Next the group reached Elephanta Cave through boat for an hour. It was an inspiring delight experience and also the group had mini train experience, it was new and excited experience for all. **Elephanta Caves** are a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a collection of cave temples predominantly dedicated to the Hindu god Shiva. They are on Elephanta Island, or Gharapuri (literally "the city of caves"), in Mumbai Harbour, 10 kilometers east of Mumbai in the Indian state of Maharashtra. The island, about 2 kilometres west of the Jawaharlal Nehru Port, consists of five Hindu caves and a few Buddhist stupa mounds that date back to the 2nd century BCE, as well as a small group of two Buddhist caves with water tanks. The Elephanta Caves contain rock cut stone sculptures that show syncretism of Hindu and Buddhist ideas and iconography. The caves are hewn from solid basalt rock. Except for a few exceptions, much of the artwork is defaced and damaged. The main temple's orientation as well as the relative location of other temples are placed in a mandala pattern.

The carvings narrate Hindu mythologies, with the large monolithic 20 feet Trimurti Sadashiva (three-faced Shiva), Nataraja (Lord of dance) and Yogishvara (Lord of Yoga) being the most celebrated. The origins and date when the caves were constructed have attracted considerable speculations and scholarly attention since the 19th century. These date them between 5th and 9th century, and attribute them to various Hindu dynasties. They are more commonly placed between 5th and 7th centuries. Most scholars consider it to have been completed by about 550 CE.

They were named Elefante – which morphed to Elephanta – by the colonial Portuguese when they found elephant statues on it. They established a base on the island, and its soldiers damaged the sculpture and caves. The main cave (Cave 1, or the Great Cave) was a Hindu place of worship until the Portuguese arrived, whereupon the island ceased to be an active place of worship. The earliest attempts to prevent further damage to the Caves were started by British India officials in 1909. The monuments were restored in the 1970s. In 1987, the restored Elephanta Caves were designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. It is currently maintained by the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI). At 2:00pm all had lunch and started travel to reached fashion street at 5:00pm for shopping. After shopping the group reached the staying place at 8:00pm and had supper. Then all the trainees visited Vijay Ashram and met Mr.Shojin (Project Manager) and donated 5000 Rs to the trust and finished the Mumbai visit.

Day: 5

Fifth day the study tour was started at 4:00am from Mumbai staying place to Vikroli Railway station to reach Dadar Railway station. From Dadar Railway station kickoff to Pune. The trainees had breakfast at 9:30am. Then the group visited Southern Comman Museum at 11:00am. The National War Memorial Southern Command is a war memorial in Pune Cantonment, India, dedicated to post-Independence war martyrs. This is the only war memorial in South Asia which has been erected by citizens' contributions. The memorial was unveiled and dedicated to the nation on 15 August 1998. A MiG-23BN, used in the Kargil War, is on display at the memorial. A replica of the now decommissioned frigate INS *Trishul*, which served in the Liberation of Goa and the Indo-Pakistani War of 1971, is also on display.

Recently, the Pune Cantonment Board sanctioned a sum of 32, 00,000 for renovation of the memorial. The work included laying a new lawn, landscaping and laying pathways for visitors. Group acquired more historically knowledge about National war martyrs.

Next the group reached Pappal Seminary at Pune. **Papal Seminary**, Pune, India, is a Catholic educational institute, primarily meant for the training of future priests of India. At the moment it caters to the formation of about 180 Seminarians from all over India. The group had lunch at 1:30pm from the seminary.

Chaitanya Institute for mental health

Then the group visited Chaitanya Institution for Mental Health at 3:00pm and attended orientation class by Mr.Anto Augustine (co-ordinator). Chaitanya Institute for Mental Health is one of the leading Residential Psychiatric Care Centers in western region of India, established for the acute management and community based psycho social rehabilitation of the mentally ill. Currently Chaitanya provides residential care facilities for patients suffering from various psychiatric disorders such as Schizophrenia, Mood disorders, Personality disorders, Substance related disorders and Geriatric disorders. In reality, Mental illness accounts for five or ten leading causes of distress and disability in Asia. Although there are

various types of mental disorders, schizophrenia which is characterized by abnormalities in the perception or expression of reality has 1 % of the general population affected. Substance Abuse is another major cause of suffering in this world and those with dual diagnosis are even more personified dilemma. Psychological Evaluation, Diagnosis and Acute Care treatment needs to be followed up with Rehabilitation for a better success rate. This gives the patient space to restructure their lives and to gain more insight into their illness, besides giving temporary respite to the Caregiver.

Goal and Objectives:

CIMH's ultimate goal is to reintegrate the chronic, mentally ill back into their families and society. Towards this achievement, Chaitanya works on specific objectives like –

- Providing Psychosocial Rehabilitation services to the individuals suffering from mental illness.
- Offering Psychological and Social Support to the families of the mentally ill.
- Promoting Mental Health and creating Awareness about mental illness in the community.
- Networking with other organizations working in the field of Mental Health.

Then he explained about the services provided were comprehensive Rehabilitation, bio-psycho-social services are always in coordination with various professionals, for the treatment and Rehabilitation of individuals affected with chronic Mental Illness and Substance Dependence. Chaitanya requires Psychiatric Social Workers, Doctors, Nurses and other Staff Assistants like home nurses, etc. Then the session was concluded with the vote of thanks by Miss. Joythisha. Later, the group visited different wards which are planned for the patients with different disorder.

After that the group finished the Chaitanya visit, they went Japanese Garden, Pune-Okayama Friendship Garden or Pu La Deshpande Udyan is one of the largest gardens located on Sinhagad Road (Narvir Tanaji Malusare Road) in Pune, Maharashtra, India. The garden was inspired by the 300-year-old Kōraku-en Garden in Okayama, so it is also called the Pune-Okayama Friendship Garden. The garden has naturally flowing water from a canal, and this flow has been spread across the garden. The garden is well maintained, and walking on the lawn is not allowed. The garden is built on 10 acres. The style is devised in such a way that people can take a walk through a garden enjoying the landscape, which changes along the garden paths. Visitors can see colourful fish from on top of a small bridge in the center of garden. This Japanese garden has been named after Pu La Deshpande, a well known Marathi

writer from Maharashtra, India. The trainees enjoyed and spending some time there by playing, relaxing and taking photos. Ended the Pune visit at 6:00pm. The group had dinner at 8:45pm and started the journey from Pune to Goa through bus at 9:10pm.

The group entered Goa at 10:00am for the sixth day visit. The group had the breakfast at 11:00 am and visited Basilica of Bom Jesus, Old Goa. The Basilica of Bom Jesus (Portuguese: Basílica do Bom Jesus; Konkani: Borea Jezuchi Bajilika) is a Roman Catholic basilica located in Goa, India, and is part of the Churches and convents of Goa UNESCO World Heritage Site. The Jesus church is Indian's first minor Basilica, and is considered to be one of the seven wonders of Portuguese origin in the world. The church contains the body of St.Francis Xavier, died on Sancian Island. The body of Francis Xavier was first taken to Portuguese Malacca and two years later shipped back to Goa. It is said that the saint's body was as fresh as the day it was buried. It is one of the oldest churches in Goa as well as in India. Finished the visit and all the members reached the staying pace and by 2:00pm all had lunch. Shapely at 3:00pm the group reached Baga beach and had boat ride for 45 min and saw Dolphins, Millionaire Palace, Central Jail, Light House and Fort Aguada. During the boating there was a great rain. The group enjoyed the boating during the time of rain and reached the staying place at 8:30pm and had dinner at 9:00am. After dinner evaluation started and each trainees shared their learning experience and suggestions and at 11:30pm the evaluation was concluded.

Day: 7

On the day of seventh the trainees had prayer at 7:30am and followed by breakfast at 8:00am the group visited nearby catholic called St.Augustin. The church was built on top of the Monte Santo (Holy Hill), between 1597 and 1602 by Augustinian friars who landed in Goa in 1587. The church was considered as one of the three great Augustinian churches in the Iberian world along with El Escorial and the Monastery of Sao Vicente de Fora. The church was abandoned in 1835 after the Portuguese government of Goa began evicting many religious orders in Goa under its new repressive policies. The subsequent neglect caused the vault of the

church to collapse in 1842. The body collapsed soon after and by 1871, the bell was moved from the tower to Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception Church in Panjim, where it remains to date. In 1931, the facade of the church and half the tower collapsed and by 1938, most of the other parts had also collapsed. Currently only half the tower remains, and it is one of the most visited tourist destinations in Goa. The ruins were featured in the song *Gumnaam Hai Koi* from the 1965 suspense thriller movie Gumnaam and 'Saathiya' from the bollywood hit Singham.

Then the group departed at 8:45am to visit Big Foot Art Gallary. A miniature Goan village set up to recreate the rural life of old days. It is privately run by an artist called Maendra Jocelino Araujo Alvares. The open-air museum recreates Goan rural life as it was a hundred years ago. At Ancestral Goa there are a number of places to visit such as an art gallery where one can see work done by local children and artists of State and National fame. There is a handicraft centre where one can get some locally made Goan artifacts, Big Foot dance floor, Big Foot restaurant, a cross, a spring known as Boca da Vaca, a bird habitat, a spice yard, rubber plantations and lots more.

In this model village one can also see different miniature houses that showcase traditional occupation and social classes such as fishermen, Goan artisans, a Music school known as Escola da Musica, farmers, liquors shops, the village market, and a feni distillery. The main highlight however at Ancestral Goa is the giant 14 meter sculpture of Sant Mirabai

carved in 30 days by MJA Alavres the enterprising artist cum museum owner. This has been cited in the Limca book of records for being the longest laterite sculpture in India. At Ancestral Goa one is accompanied by a guide who explains the exhibits. Also one can purchase souvenirs on the way out from the handicraft centre. The museum is open on all days from 9 am to 6 pm and has a small entry fee. The museum has many sections with the reception and Parasuram, The Legendary Lord who is the avatar of Lord Vishnu is believed to have created the land of Goa by shooting an arrow from the Sahyadri mountains into the Arabian Sea.

Layout - The museum also has fisherman - Victorin, cowshed and haystack. Then comes the Bhatti- Jaki's distillery where Goa's famous "Feni" and "Urak" is distilled. Each traditional things were explained by an audio recorder and the statuses were displayed.

Then the potter - Nandu, Then carperter - Inas and the Shepherd-krish. The Craft Village where craftsmen are busy working on their ware.

Then comes the flower-seller, Basket Weaver, Bangle seller, Gram seller, The Cobbler and Tinto, which is a market place where fresh food products are sold.

Then Anand's House, Music school of Maestre Cloude, Posro, the general stores or a shop, Taverna, the Country liquor shop made of stone and mud. Then Goan Farmer, Fowl-Path, the Hutch.

The Legend of the Big Foot: Anyone stepping on it pure at heart will be blessed with good luck. Then there is a Bird Display, Old Warrior, and Cave- Water Station.

After that the trainee had lunch at 1:00pm and then visited another beach Dona Paula. The place is named after Da. Paula Amaral Antonia de Souto-Maior, a historical figure in Portuguese India. She was related to the Portuguese Viceroy of Jaffnapatnam, in Sri Lanka. She and her family arrived in Goa in 1744 and she married a Fidalgo from Spain in 1756. Her father was D. Antonio Caetano de Menezes Souto-Maior. They were an extremely affluent family, and the entire property from the present day Cabo Raj Nivas all the way to Caranzalem

belonged to the Souto Maior's. She died on 21 December 1782 .Dona Paula was a woman of charity and is known to have helped the villagers and worked a lot for their betterment, so after her death, the villagers decided to rename the village as Dona Paula. Initially the village was called Oddavell. The Dona Paula Beach is also a major tourist attraction. According to a local myth, Dona Paula entombed in the Cabo Chapel, the residence of the Governor of Goa and is supposed to be seen emerging from the moonlit waves wearing only a pearl necklace. Several tourists as well as locals guided by this myth visit the beach for a glimpse of Dona Paula. The Cabo Raj Bhavan is situated at a scenic spot of Dona Paula. It is also home of a historic British war-graves cemetery. After the end of Portuguese rule in Goa in 1961, Dona Paula became a fashionable residential area and address. Group enjoyed in the beach and the group went for shopping and returned back to the staying place at 6:30pm.






Day 2:

A , public relation coordinator seeked permission from four companies namely DCW Pvt Ltd, VV Trade union, MAX at Thoothukudi due to covid pandemic three companies rejected the request. The company were permitt the HR trainees to visit the company on 18/11/2021. The trainees were asked to wear Formal dress, shoes, mask etc when entering in to the industry. The trainees accepted the rules and planned to visit the company. The trainees decided to go Thoothukudi on 17/11/2021 evening and planned to retun 19/11/2021. DCW is a diversified manufacturer of basic chemicals, such as: Caustic Soda, Liquid Chlorine and Chlorine based products such as Trichloroethylene and HCL, Upgraded Ilmenite or Synthetic Rutile, Yellow Iron Oxide, PVC Resin, Soda Ash, Ammonium bi–carbonate and Liquid Bromine and Bromide. Then Mr. Ravi kumar introduced Mr. Suresh, Energy manager and Mr. Sathya moorthy, safety officer. They shared information about fire, safety and environmental control measures.

Industrial safety:

Industrial safety is mainly related to the minimization of various industrial hazards. Any physical or chemical situation which can result in the injury of an individual or can cause any kind of harm to the health of a person is termed as a hazard. Hazards can result in some types of dangers or threats. Due to the occurrence of millions of industrial accidents causing either the death or momentary or permanent disability of the manpower and huge losses caused to the property and assets damages and unutilized man and machines hours, the significance of industrial safety is becoming more important.

Safety equipments:

Personal protective equipment (PPE) is protective clothing, helmets, goggles, or other garments or equipment designed to protect the wearer's body from injury or infection. The hazards

addressed by protective equipment include physical, electrical, heat, chemicals, biohazards, and airborne particulate matter. Protective equipment may be worn for job-related occupational safety and health purposes, as well as for sports and other recreational activities. Protective clothing is applied to traditional categories of clothing, and protective gear applies to items such as pads, guards, shields, or masks, and others. PPE suits can be similar in appearance to a cleanroom suit.

ACCIDENTS

Accidents never happen but are caused. They are not accidental. They are not accidental but are due to fore seeable causes! Accident means an injury to the worker occurring during and in the course of his employment. The criterion for accident are 1) Injury must occur during working hours 2) It must occur in the course of work 3) The injured person must be a worker.

Accident proneness:

Continued and unattached machine defects may lead to repeated accidents. But victims of such situations should not be described as accident prone. Accident proneness is a psychological condition. It could arise from fears, anxieties, complexes and obsessions. These psychological factors destroy concentration at work. A person of such psychological condition is liable to get into accidents.

Types of accidents:

Accidents are of different types: Major or minor accidents or fatal or non fatal accidents. An accident that ends in death of a worker is called a major accident. A scratch or a cut which does not lead to disability of worker is called minor accident. Major accident either leads to fatal or disability. Accidents are also divided into temporary disability and permanent disability. A worker is disabled by injury for an hour or a day or a week and if he recovers from the disability it is called temporary disability. If he never recovers from his injury, it is called permanent disability.

Hiring process:

An efficient and effective hiring process is a step-by-step process for hiring a new employee, whereby an organization identifies its talent needs, recruits from its talent pool and eventually hires the most qualified candidates. Most companies have their own hiring processes. What follows are the most common steps in the hiring process across industry and regardless of company size. Keep in mind, however, that the specific details of the hiring process are unique to each company.

Steps of hiring process:

- 1. Identifying the hiring needs.
- 2. Devise a recruitment plan.
- 3. Write a job description.

- 4. Advertise the position.
- 5. Recruit the position.
- 6. Review applications.
- 7. Phone interview/ intial screening.
- 8. Interviews.
- 9. Applicant assessment.
- 10. Background check.
- 11. Decision.
- 12. Reference check.
- 13. Job offer.
- 14. Hiring.
- 15. Onboarding.

Steps in a Progressive Discipline Process:

1. Verbal warning.

This is typically the first step in the discipline process. In this step, employees should receive verbal warnings in private. The exact nature of what took place and why it is in violation of policy, or how it falls short of performance expectations, should be explained, along with corrective actions. HR should be notified of the warning.

2. Formal written warning.

This is often the second step in the discipline process. In this step, the manager or supervisor should use a write-up form to describe the incident and corrective actions. The employee should read the form and sign that they received it.

3. Formal disciplinary meeting.

This is usually the third step in the discipline process. In this step the employee, manager/supervisor, and an HR representative meet to discuss the problem. HR investigates the problem. The employee is informed that after this point punitive action may take place, up to, and including termination.

4. Suspension or loss of privileges.

This is typically the fourth step in the discipline process. In this step, the employee may receive penalties, such as a loss of certain privileges, suspension from some or all duties, a demotion, or other appropriate penalties.

5. Termination.

This is usually the final step in the discipline process. In this step, the employee is fired for continued violations. The final decision to terminate will be approved by an HR representative after an investigation to ensure fairness.

Final Thoughts:

Having a company disciplinary policy in place will take away a lot of uncertainty from employees, and help ensure that your company or organization has a fair process that treats everyone equally.

After lunch HR trainee moved to visit the plant. The supervisor Mr. Veeramani has guided all the trainees, how to maintain safety measures and about the manufacturing process and the strict regulations followed in weighing of all the required chemicals used in formulation. The next section started at 2:00pm which was handled by Mr. Sundar Raj, HR manager about his roles. At the end of the section Ms. Hasafia one of the HR trainee delivered vote of thanks.
